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# Coding Error Exponents for Asymmetric Two-User Discrete Memoryless Source-Channel Systems* 

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#### Abstract

Consider transmitting two discrete memoryless correlated sources, consisting of a common and a private source, over a discrete memoryless multi-terminal channel with two transmitters and two receivers. At the transmitter side, the common source is observed by both encoders but the private source can only be accessed by one encoder. At the receiver side, both decoders need to reconstruct the common source, but only one decoder needs to reconstruct the private source. We hence refer to this system by the asymmetric 2 -user source-channel system. In this work, we derive a universally achievable joint source-channel coding (JSCC) error exponent pair for the 2 -user system by using a technique which generalizes Csiszár's method [8] for the point-to-point (single-user) discrete memoryless source-channel system. We next investigate the largest convergence rate of asymptotic exponential decay of the system (overall) probability of erroneous transmission, i.e., the system JSCC error exponent. We obtain lower and upper bounds for the exponent. As a consequence, we establish the JSCC theorem with single letter characterization.


Index Terms: discrete memoryless correlated sources, broadcast channel, multiple access channel, common and private message, joint source-channel coding, error exponent, type packing lemma.

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## 1 Introduction

Recently, the study of the error exponent (reliability function) for point-to-point (single-user) sourcechannel systems (with or without memory) has illustrated substantial superiority of joint source-channel coding (JSCC) over the traditional tandem coding (i.e., separate source and channel coding) approach (e.g., [8], [23], [24]). It is of natural interest to study the JSCC error exponent for multi-terminal source-channel systems.

In this work we address the asymmetric 2 -user source-channel system depicted in Fig. 1. Two discrete memoryless correlated source messages $(\mathbf{s}, \mathbf{1}) \in \mathcal{S}^{\tau n} \times \mathcal{L}^{\tau n}$ drawn from a joint distribution $Q_{S L}: \mathcal{S} \times \mathcal{L}$, consisting of a common source messages $\mathbf{s}$ and a private source message $\mathbf{l}$ of length $\tau n$, are transmitted over a discrete memoryless asymmetric communication channel described by $W_{Y Z \mid U X}: \mathcal{U} \times \mathcal{X} \rightarrow \mathcal{Y} \times \mathcal{Z}$ with block codes of length $n$, where $\tau>0$ (measured in source symbol/channel use) is the overall transmission rate. The common source can be accessed by both encoders, but the private source can only be observed by one encoder (say, Encoder 1). In this set-up, the goal is to send the common information to both receivers, and send the private information to only one receiver (say, Decoder 1).

It is worthy to point out that the asymmetric 2 -user system can be specialized to the following two classical asymmetric multi-terminal scenarios.
(i) The CS-AMAC system: If we remove Decoder 2 from Fig. 1, and let $|\mathcal{Z}|=1$, then the channel reduces to a multiple-access channel $W_{Y \mid U X}$, and the coding problem reduces to transmitting two correlated sources (CS) over an asymmetric multiple-access channel (AMAC) with one receiver.
(ii) The CS-ABC system: If we remove Encoder 2 from Fig. 1, and let $|\mathcal{U}|=1$, then the channel reduces to a broadcast channel $W_{Y Z \mid X}$, and the coding problem reduces to transmitting two CS over an asymmetric broadcast channel (ABC) with one transmitter.

The sufficient and necessary condition for the reliable transmission of CS over the AMAC - i.e., the JSCC theorem for the CS-AMAC system - has been derived with single letter characterization in [4]. The capacity region of the ABC has been determined in [19], and the JSCC theorem for CS-ABC system with arbitrary transmission rate can also be analogously carried out (e.g., [16]). In this work, we study a refined version of the JSCC theorem for the general asymmetric 2-user system (depicted in Fig. 1), by investigating the achievable JSCC error exponent pair (for two receivers) as well as the system JSCC error exponent, i.e., the largest convergence rate of asymptotic exponential decay of the system (overall) probability of erroneous transmission. We also apply our results to the CS-AMAC and CS-ABC systems.

We outline our results as follows. We first extend Csiszár's type packing lemma [8] from a single-letter (1-dimension) type setting to a joint (2-dimensional) type setting. By employing the joint type packing lemma and generalized maximum mutual information (MMI) decoders, we establish achievable exponential
upper bounds for the probabilities of erroneous transmission over an augmented 2-user channel $W_{Y Z \mid T U X}$ for a given triple of $n$-length sequences $(\mathbf{t}, \mathbf{u}, \mathbf{x})$; see Theorem 1 . Here, the augmented channel $W_{Y Z \mid T U X}$ is induced from the original 2-user channel $W_{Y Z \mid U X}$ by adding an auxiliary random variable (RV) $T$ such that $T,(U X)$, and $(Y Z)$, form a Markov chain in this order. We introduce the RV $T$ because we will employ superposition encoding which maps a source message pair ( $\mathbf{s}, \mathbf{l}$ ) to a codeword triplet ( $\mathbf{t}, \mathbf{u}, \mathbf{x}$ ), where $\mathbf{t}$ is the the auxiliary superposition codeword. For the asymmetric 2 -user system, since one of the encoders has full access to both sources, it knows the output of the other. By properly designing the two (superposition) encoders, we apply Theorem 1 to establish a universally achievable error exponent pair for the two receivers (namely, the pair of exponents can be achieved by a sequence of source-channel codes independent of the statistics of the source and the channel); this generalizes Körner and Sgarro's exponent pair for ABC coding (with uniform message sets) [20]. We also employ Theorem 1 to establish a lower bound for the system JSCC error exponent; see Theorem 2. Note that one consequence of our results is a sufficient condition (forward part) for the JSCC theorem. In addition, we use Fano's inequality to prove a necessary condition (converse part) which coincides with the sufficient condition, and hence completes the JSCC theorem (Theorem 3). Using an approach analogous to [8], we also obtain an upper bound for the system JSCC error exponent (Theorem 4). As applications, we then specialize these results to the CS-AMAC and CS-ABC systems. The computation of the lower and upper bounds for the system JSCC error exponent is partially studied for the CS-AMAC system when the channel admits a symmetric conditional distribution.

At this point we pause to mention some related works in the literature on the multi-terminal JSCC of CS. The JSCC theorem for transmitting two CS over a (symmetric) multiple access channel (each encoder can only access one source) has been studied in [1, 7, 13, 17, 18, 22], and the JSCC theorem for transmitting two CS over a (symmetric) broadcast channel (each decoder needs to reconstruct one source) has been addressed in [5, 16]. These works focus on the case when the overall transmission rate $\tau$ is 1 and establish some sufficient and/or necessary conditions for which the sources can be reliably transmitted over the channel. However, for both (symmetric) systems, no matter whether the transmission rate $\tau$ is 1 or not, the tight sufficient and necessary condition (JSCC theorem) with single-letter characterization is still unknown.

The rest of the paper is organized as follows. In Section 2, we introduce the notation and some basic facts regarding the method of types. A generalized joint type packing lemma is presented in Section 3. In Section 4 we establish a universally achievable error exponent pair for the 2-user system, as well as a lower and an upper bound for the system JSCC error exponent. A JSCC theorem with single-letter characterization is given. In Section 5, we apply our results for the CS-AMAC and CS-ABC systems. Finally, we partially address the computation for the bounds for the system JSCC error exponent in Section 6.

## 2 Preliminaries

The following notations and conventions are adopted from [8, 11]. For any finite set (or alphabet) $\mathcal{X}$, the size of $\mathcal{X}$ is denoted by $|\mathcal{X}|$. The set of all probability distributions on $\mathcal{X}$ is denoted by $\mathcal{P}(\mathcal{X})$. The type of an $n$-length sequence $\mathbf{x} \in \mathcal{X}^{n}$ is the empirical probability distribution $P_{\mathbf{x}} \in \mathcal{P}(\mathcal{X})$ defined by

where $N(a \mid \mathbf{x})$ is the number of occurrences of $a$ in $\mathbf{x}$. Let $\mathcal{P}_{n}(\mathcal{X}) \subseteq \mathcal{P}(\mathcal{X})$ be the collection of all types of sequences in $\mathcal{X}^{n}$. For any $P_{X} \in \mathcal{P}_{n}(\mathcal{X})$, the set of all $\mathbf{x} \in \mathcal{X}^{n}$ with type $P_{X}$ is denoted by $\mathbb{T}_{P_{X}}$, or simply by $\mathbb{T}_{X}$ if $P_{X}$ is understood. We also call $\mathbb{T}_{P_{X}}$ or $\mathbb{T}_{X}$ a type class.

Similarly, the joint type of $n$-length sequences $\mathbf{x} \in \mathcal{X}^{n}$ and $\mathbf{y} \in \mathcal{Y}^{n}$ is the empirical joint probability distribution $P_{\mathbf{x y}} \in \mathcal{P}(\mathcal{X} \times \mathcal{Y})$ defined by

Let $\mathcal{P}_{n}(\mathcal{X} \times \mathcal{Y}) \subseteq \mathcal{P}_{n}(\mathcal{X} \times \mathcal{Y})$ be the collection of all joint types of sequences in $\mathcal{X}^{n} \times \mathcal{Y}^{n}$. The set of all $\mathbf{x} \in \mathcal{X}^{n}$ and $\mathbf{y} \in \mathcal{Y}^{n}$ with joint type $P_{X Y} \in \mathcal{P}_{n}(\mathcal{X} \times \mathcal{Y})$ is denoted by $\mathbb{T}_{P_{X Y}}$, or simply by $\mathbb{T}_{X Y}$.

For any finite sets $\mathcal{X}$ and $\mathcal{Y}$, the set of all conditional distributions $V_{Y \mid X}: \mathcal{X} \rightarrow \mathcal{Y}$ is denoted by $\mathcal{P}(\mathcal{Y} \mid \mathcal{X})$. The conditional type of $\mathbf{y} \in \mathcal{Y}^{n}$ given $\mathbf{x} \in \mathbb{T}_{P_{X}}$ is the empirical conditional probability distribution $P_{\mathbf{y} \mid \mathbf{x}} \in \mathcal{P}(\mathcal{Y} \mid \mathcal{X})$ defined by

Let $\mathcal{P}_{n}\left(\mathcal{Y} \mid P_{X}\right)$ be the collection of all conditional distributions $V_{Y \mid X}$ which are conditional types of $\mathbf{y} \in \mathcal{Y}^{n}$ given an $\mathbf{x} \in \mathbb{T}_{P_{X}}$. For any conditional type $V_{Y \mid X} \in \mathcal{P}_{n}\left(\mathcal{Y} \mid P_{X}\right)$, the set of all $\mathbf{y} \in \mathcal{Y}^{n}$ for a given $\mathbf{x} \in \mathbb{T}_{P_{X}}$ satisfying $P_{\mathbf{y} \mid \mathbf{x}}=V_{Y \mid X}$ is denoted by $\mathbb{T}_{V_{Y \mid X}}(\mathbf{x})$, or simply by $\mathbb{T}_{Y \mid X}(\mathbf{x})$, which is also called a conditional type class ( $V$-shell) with respect to $\mathbf{x}$.

For finite sets $\mathcal{X}, \mathcal{Y}, \mathcal{Z}$ with joint distribution $P_{X Y Z} \in \mathcal{P}(\mathcal{X} \times \mathcal{Y} \times \mathcal{Z})$, we use $P_{X}, P_{X Y}, P_{Y Z \mid X}$, etc, to denote the corresponding marginal and conditional probabilities induced by $P_{X Y Z}$. Conversely, $P_{X} P_{Y Z \mid X}$ denotes a joint distribution on $\mathcal{X} \times \mathcal{Y} \times \mathcal{Z}$ with marginal distribution $P_{X}$ and conditional distribution $P_{Y Z \mid X}$. Note that for a given joint type $P_{X Y} \in \mathcal{P}_{n}(\mathcal{X} \times \mathcal{Y}), \mathbb{T}_{P_{Y \mid X}}(\mathbf{x})=\left\{\mathbf{y}:(\mathbf{x}, \mathbf{y}) \in \mathbb{T}_{P_{X Y}}\right\}$. Note also that

To distinguish different distributions (or types) defined on the same alphabet, we use sub-subscript, say, $i, j$, in $P_{X_{i}}, P_{X_{i} Y_{j}}, \mathbb{T}_{X_{i} Y_{j}}$, and so on. For example, $\mathbb{T}_{X_{i} Y_{j}}$ is the type class of the joint type $P_{X_{i} Y_{j}} \in \mathcal{P}_{n}(\mathcal{X} \times \mathcal{Y})$.

For any distribution $P_{X Y Z} \in \mathcal{P}(\mathcal{X} \times \mathcal{Y} \times \mathcal{Z})$, we use $H_{P_{X Y Z}}(\cdot)$ and $I_{P_{X Y Z}}(\cdot ; \cdot)$ to denote the entropy and mutual information under $P_{X Y Z}$, respectively, or simply by $H(\cdot)$ and $I(\cdot ; \cdot)$ if $P_{X Y Z}$ is understood. $D\left(P_{X} \| Q_{X}\right)$ denotes the Kullback-Leibler divergence between distributions $P_{X}, Q_{X} \in \mathcal{P}(\mathcal{X}) . D\left(V_{Y \mid X} \|\right.$ $\left.W_{Y \mid X} \mid P_{X}\right)$ denotes the Kullback-Leibler divergence between stochastic matrices (conditional distributions) $V_{Y \mid X}, W_{Y \mid X} \in \mathcal{P}(\mathcal{Y} \mid \mathcal{X})$ conditional on distribution $P_{X} \in \mathcal{P}(\mathcal{X})$. For $\mathbf{x} \in \mathcal{X}^{n}, \mathbf{y} \in \mathcal{Y}^{n}$ and $\mathbf{z} \in \mathcal{Z}^{n}$, since the types $P_{\mathbf{x}}, P_{\mathbf{x y}}$ and $P_{\mathrm{xyz}}$ can also be represented as distributions of dummy RV's, we define the empirical entropy and mutual information by $H(\mathbf{x}) \triangleq H_{P_{\mathbf{x}}}(X), I(\mathbf{x} ; \mathbf{y}) \triangleq I_{P_{\mathbf{x y}}}(X ; Y)$ and $I(\mathbf{x} ; \mathbf{y} \mid \mathbf{z}) \triangleq I_{P_{\mathbf{x y z}}}(X ; Y \mid Z)$. Given distributions $P_{X} \in \mathcal{P}(\mathcal{X})$ and $W_{Y \mid X} \in \mathcal{P}(\mathcal{Y} \mid \mathcal{X})$, let $P_{X}^{(n)}$ and $W_{Y \mid X}^{(n)}$ be their $n$-dimension product distributions. All logarithms and exponentials throughout this paper are in base 2. The following facts will be widely used throughout this paper.

## 3 A Joint Type Packing Lemma

We extend Csiszár's type packing lemma [8, Theorem. 5] from a (1-dimensional) single-letter type setting to a (2-dimensional) joint type setting. This lemma plays a key role in deriving an exponentially achievable upper bound for the probability of erroneous transmission for the asymmetric 2 -user channel.

Lemma 2 (Joint Type Packing Lemma) Given finite sets $\mathcal{A}$ and $\mathcal{B}$, a sequence of positive integers $\left\{m_{n}\right\}$, and a sequence of positive integers $\left\{m_{i n}^{\prime}\right\}$ associated with every $i=1,2, \ldots, m_{n}$, for arbitrary (not necessarily
distinct) types $P_{A_{i}} \in \mathcal{P}_{n}(\mathcal{A})$ and conditional types $P_{B_{j} \mid A_{i}} \in \mathcal{P}_{n}\left(\mathcal{B} \mid P_{A_{i}}\right)$, and positive integers $N_{i}$ and $M_{i j}$, $i=1,2, \ldots, m_{n}$ and $j=j(i)=1,2, \ldots, m_{\text {in }}^{\prime}$ with

for any $i, j, k, l, p, q$ and $V_{A^{\prime} B^{\prime} \mid A B} \in \mathcal{P}_{n}(\mathcal{A} \times \mathcal{B} \mid \mathcal{A} \times \mathcal{B})$, with the exception of the case when both $i=k$, $j=l$ and $V_{A^{\prime} B^{\prime} \mid A B}$ is the conditional distribution such that $V_{A^{\prime} B^{\prime} \mid A B}\left(a^{\prime}, b^{\prime} \mid a, b\right)$ is 1 if $\left(a^{\prime}, b^{\prime}\right)=(a, b)$ and 0 otherwise.

The proof of the packing lemma is lengthy and is deferred to Appendix A. We remark that the assertion of (3) is Csiszár's type packing lemma [8, Theorem 5] for a single-letter type setting. Roughly and intuitively, if $(\mathbf{a}, \mathbf{b})$ is a pair of transmitted codewords, then the possible sequences decoded as $(\mathbf{a}, \mathbf{b})$ can be seen as elements in the "sphere" $\mathbb{T}_{V_{A^{\prime} B^{\prime} \mid A B}}(\mathbf{a}, \mathbf{b})$ "centered" at $(\mathbf{a}, \mathbf{b})$ for some $V_{A^{\prime} B^{\prime} \mid A B}$. Equation (4) in the packing lemma (similar to (3) and (5)) states that there exist disjoint sets $\Omega_{k l}=\bigcup_{p^{\prime}=1}^{N_{k}} \Omega_{k l}\left(\mathbf{a}_{p^{\prime}}^{(k)}\right)$
with bounded cardinalities such that the size of intersection between the sphere $\mathbb{T}_{V_{A^{\prime} B^{\prime} \mid A B}}(\mathbf{a}, \mathbf{b})$ for every $(\mathbf{a}, \mathbf{b}) \in \Omega_{i j}$ and every set $\Omega_{k l}$ is "exponentially small" compared with the size of each $\Omega_{k l}$. So the packing lemma can be used to prove the existence of good codes that have an exponentially small probability of error.

Note also that the above extended packing lemma is analogous to, but different from the one introduced by Körner and Sgarro in [20], which is used to prove a lower bound for the channel coding ABC exponent. Lemma 2 here is used for the JSCC problem.

## 4 Transmitting CS over the Asymmetric 2-User Channel

### 4.1 System

Let $\left\{W_{Y Z \mid U X}: \mathcal{U} \times \mathcal{X} \rightarrow \mathcal{Y} \times \mathcal{Z}\right\}$ be a 2-user discrete memoryless channel with finite input alphabet $\mathcal{U} \times \mathcal{X}$, finite output alphabet $\mathcal{Y} \times \mathcal{Z}$, and a transition distribution $W_{Y Z \mid U X}(y, z \mid u, x)$ such that the $n$-tuple transition probability is

where $u \in \mathcal{U}, x \in \mathcal{X}, y \in \mathcal{Y}, z \in \mathcal{Z}, \mathbf{u} \triangleq\left(u_{1}, \ldots, u_{n}\right) \in \mathcal{U}^{n}, \mathbf{x} \triangleq\left(x_{1}, \ldots, x_{n}\right) \in \mathcal{X}^{n}, \mathbf{y} \triangleq\left(y_{1}, \ldots, y_{n}\right) \in \mathcal{Y}^{n}$, and $\mathbf{z} \triangleq\left(z_{1}, \ldots, z_{n}\right) \in \mathcal{Z}^{n}$. Denote the marginal transition distributions of $W_{Y Z \mid U X}$ at its $Y$-output (respectively $Z$-output) by $W_{Y \mid U X} \triangleq \sum_{Z} W_{Y Z \mid U X}$ (respectively $W_{Z \mid U X} \triangleq \sum_{Y} W_{Y Z \mid U X}$ ). The marginal distributions of $W_{Y Z \mid U X}^{(n)}$ are denoted by $W_{Y \mid U X}^{(n)}$ and $W_{Z \mid U X}^{(n)}$, respectively.

Consider two discrete memoryless CS with a generic joint distribution $Q_{S L}(s, l)$ defined on the finite alphabet $\mathcal{S} \times \mathcal{L}$ such that the $k$-tuple joint distribution is $Q_{S L}^{(k)}(\mathbf{s}, \mathbf{l})=\prod_{i=1}^{k} Q_{S L}\left(s_{i}, l_{i}\right)$, where $(s, l) \in \mathcal{S} \times \mathcal{L}$, and $(\mathbf{s}, \mathbf{l}) \triangleq\left(\left(s_{1}, l_{1}\right), \ldots,\left(s_{k}, l_{k}\right)\right) \in \mathcal{S}^{k} \times \mathcal{L}^{k}$. For each pair of source messages ( $\left.\mathbf{s}, \mathbf{l}\right)$ drawn from the above joint distribution, we need to transmit the common message s over the channel $W_{Y Z \mid U X}$ to Receivers $Y$ and $Z$ and transmit the private message $\mathbf{l}$ only to Receiver $Y$. A joint source-channel (JSC) code with block length $n$ and transmission rate $\tau$ (source symbol/channel use) for transmitting $Q_{S L}$ through $W_{Y Z \mid U X}$ is a quadruple of mappings, $\left(f_{n}, g_{n}, \varphi_{n}, \psi_{n}\right)$, where $f_{n}: \mathcal{S}^{\tau n} \times \mathcal{L}^{\tau n} \rightarrow \mathcal{X}^{n}$ and $g_{n}: \mathcal{S}^{\tau n} \rightarrow \mathcal{U}^{n}$ are called encoders, and $\varphi_{n}: \mathcal{Y}^{n} \rightarrow \mathcal{S}^{\tau n} \times \mathcal{L}^{\tau n}$ and $\psi_{n}: \mathcal{Z}^{n} \rightarrow \mathcal{S}^{\tau n}$ are referred to as $Y$-decoder and $Z$-decoder, respectively; see Fig. 1.

The probabilities of $Y$ - and $Z$-error are given by

where $\mathbf{x} \triangleq f_{n}(\mathbf{s}, \mathbf{l})$ and $\mathbf{u} \triangleq g_{n}(\mathbf{s})$ are the corresponding codewords of the source message pair $(\mathbf{s}, \mathbf{l})$ and the source message $\mathbf{s}$, and $\mathbf{y}$ and $\mathbf{z}$ are the received codewords at the Receivers $Y$ and $Z$, respectively. Since we will study the exponential behavior of these probabilities using the method of types, it might be a better way to rewrite the probabilities of $Y$ - and $Z$ - error as a sum of probabilities of types

We say that the JSCC error exponent pair $\left(E_{A Y}, E_{A Z}\right)$ is achievable with respect to $\tau>0$ if there exists a sequence of JSC codes $\left(f_{n}, g_{n}, \varphi_{n}, \psi_{n}\right)$ with transmission rate $\tau$ such that the probabilities of $Y$-error and $Z$-error are simultaneously bounded by

Definition 1 Given $Q_{S L}, W_{Y Z \mid U X}$ and $\tau>0$, the system JSCC error exponent $E_{J}\left(Q_{S L}, W_{Y Z \mid U X}, \tau\right)$ is defined as supremum of the set of all numbers $E$ for which there exists a sequence of JSC codes $\left(f_{n}, g_{n}, \varphi_{n}, \psi_{n}\right)$ with blocklength $n$ and transmission rate $\tau$ such that

Since the system probability of error must be larger than $P_{Y e}^{(n)}$ and $P_{Z e}^{(n)}$ defined by (6) and (7), and is also upper bounded by the sum of the two, it follows that for any sequence of JSC codes $\left(f_{n}, g_{n}, \varphi_{n}, \psi_{n}\right)$

### 4.2 Superposition Encoding for Asymmetric 2-User Channels

Given an asymmetric 2-user channel $W_{Y Z \mid U X}$, at the encoder side, we can artificially augment the channel input alphabet by introducing an auxiliary (arbitrary and finite) alphabet $\mathcal{T}$, and then look at the channel as a discrete memoryless channel $W_{Y Z \mid T U X}=W_{Y Z \mid U X}$ with marginal distributions $W_{Y \mid T U X}$ and $W_{Z \mid T U X}$ such that $W_{Y Z \mid T U X}(y, z \mid t, u, x)=W_{Y Z \mid U X}(y, z \mid u, x)$ for any $t \in \mathcal{T}, u \in \mathcal{U}, x \in \mathcal{X}, y \in \mathcal{Y}$ and $z \in \mathcal{Z}$. In other words, we introduce a dummy RV $T \in \mathcal{T}$ such that $T,(U, X)$, and $(Y, Z)$ form a Markov chain in this order, i.e., $T \rightarrow(U, X) \rightarrow(Y, Z)$.

The idea of superposition coding is described as follows. The encoder $g_{n}$ first maps the source message s to a pair of $n$-length sequences $(\mathbf{t}, \mathbf{u}) \in \mathcal{T}^{n} \times \mathcal{U}^{n}$ with a fixed type, say $P_{T U}$, and then sends the codeword $\mathbf{u}$ over the channel, i.e., $g_{n}(\mathbf{s})=\mathbf{u}$. The encoder $f_{n}$ first maps each pair ( $\mathbf{s}, \mathbf{l}$ ) to a triple of sequences $(\mathbf{t}, \mathbf{u}, \mathbf{x}) \in \mathcal{T}^{n} \times \mathcal{U}^{n} \times \mathcal{X}^{n}$ such that $\mathbf{x} \in \mathbb{T}_{P_{X \mid T U}}(\mathbf{t}, \mathbf{u})$, then $f_{n}$ sends the codeword $\mathbf{x}$ over the channel, i.e., $f_{n}(\mathbf{s}, \mathbf{l})=\mathbf{x}$. In other words, $g_{n}$ and $f_{n}$ map ( $\left.\mathbf{s}, \mathbf{l}\right)$ to a tuple of sequences $(\mathbf{t}, \mathbf{u}, \mathbf{x})$ with a joint type $P_{T U} P_{X \mid T U}$, although only $\mathbf{u}$ and $\mathbf{x}$ are sent to the channel, where $\mathbf{t}$ plays the role of a dummy codeword.

Since $W_{Y Z \mid T U X}^{(n)}(\mathbf{y}, \mathbf{z} \mid \mathbf{t}, \mathbf{u}, \mathbf{x})$ is equal to $W_{Y Z \mid U X}^{(n)}(\mathbf{y}, \mathbf{z} \mid \mathbf{u}, \mathbf{x})$ and is independent of $\mathbf{t}$, transmitting the codewords $(\mathbf{u}, \mathbf{x})$ through the channel $W_{Y Z \mid U X}$ can be viewed as transmitting the codewords ( $\mathbf{t}, \mathbf{u}, \mathbf{x}$ ) over the augmented channel $W_{Y Z \mid T U X}$. Here, the common outputs of $g_{n}$ and $f_{n},(\mathbf{t}, \mathbf{u})$ 's, are called auxiliary cloud centers according to the traditional superposition coding notion [3], which convey the information of the common message $\mathbf{s}$, and the codewords $\mathbf{x}$ 's corresponding to the same ( $\mathbf{t}, \mathbf{u})$ are called satellite codewords of $(\mathbf{t}, \mathbf{u})$, which contain both the common and private information. At the decoding stage, Receiver $Z$ only needs to figure out which cloud $(\mathbf{t}, \mathbf{u})$ was transmitted, and Receiver $Y$ needs to estimate not only the cloud but also the satellite codeword $\mathbf{x}$. We employ superposition encoding to derive the achievable error exponent pair and the lower bound of system JSCC error exponent in Section 4.3.

### 4.3 Achievable Exponents and a Lower Bound for $E_{J}$

Given arbitrary and finite alphabet $\mathcal{T}$, for any joint distribution $P_{T U X} \in \mathcal{P}(\mathcal{T} \times \mathcal{U} \times \mathcal{X})$ and every $R_{1}>0$, $R_{2}>0$, define

where $|x|^{+}=\max (0, x)$, and the outer minimum in (14) (respectively (15)) is taken over all conditional distributions on $\mathcal{P}(\mathcal{Y} \mid \mathcal{T} \times \mathcal{U} \times \mathcal{X})$ (respectively $\mathcal{P}(\mathcal{Z} \mid \mathcal{T} \times \mathcal{U} \times \mathcal{X})$ ). It immediately follows by definition that $E_{Y}\left(R_{1}, R_{2}, W_{Y \mid T U X}, P_{T U X}\right)$ is zero if and only if at least one of the following is satisfied

Proof: We apply the packing lemma (Lemma 2) and a generalized MMI decoding rule. ${ }^{1}$ In the sequel of the proof, we look at the superletter $(T, U)$ (respectively $X$ ) as the RV $A$ (respectively $B$ ) in Lemma 2. For the $\left\{m_{n}\right\},\left\{m_{\text {in }}^{\prime}\right\}, P_{(T U)_{i}}, P_{X_{j} \mid(T U)_{i}}$ given in Theorem 1, according to Lemma 2, there exist pairwise disjoint subsets $\Omega_{i}$ and $\Omega_{i j}\left((\mathbf{t}, \mathbf{u})_{p}^{(i)}\right)$ satisfying (3), (4), and (5) for every $1 \leq i \leq m_{n}, 1 \leq j \leq m_{i n}^{\prime}, 1 \leq p \leq N_{i}$, $V_{(T U)^{\prime} \mid T U} \in \mathcal{P}_{n}(\mathcal{T} \times \mathcal{U} \mid \mathcal{T} \times \mathcal{U})$, and $V_{(T U)^{\prime} X^{\prime} \mid T U X} \in \mathcal{P}_{n}(\mathcal{T} \times \mathcal{U} \times \mathcal{X} \mid \mathcal{T} \times \mathcal{U} \times \mathcal{X})$, with the exception of the two cases that $i=k$ and $V_{(T U)^{\prime} \mid T U}$ is the conditional distribution such that $V_{(T U)^{\prime} \mid T U}\left((t, u)^{\prime} \mid(t, u)\right)$ is 1 if $(t, u)^{\prime}=(t, u)$ and 0 otherwise, and that $i=k, j=l$ and $V_{(T U)^{\prime} X^{\prime} \mid T U X}$ is the conditional distribution such that $V_{(T U)^{\prime} X^{\prime} \mid T U X}\left((t, u)^{\prime}, x^{\prime} \mid t, u, x\right)$ is 1 if $(t, u)^{\prime}=(t, u), x^{\prime}=x$ and 0 otherwise. Let

We shall show that for such $\Omega_{i j}$, there exists a pair of mappings $\left(\varphi_{n}^{(0)}, \psi_{n}^{(0)}\right)$ such that (19) and (20) are satisfied.

We first show that there exists a $Y$-decoder $\varphi_{n}^{(0)}$ such that (19) holds. For any $((\mathbf{t}, \mathbf{u}), \mathbf{x}) \in \Omega$ and $\mathbf{y} \in \mathcal{Y}^{n}$, let

For any particular $\widehat{V}_{Y \mid T U X}$, since

\end{align*}

Substituting (25) and (26) back into (22) and (21) successively, noting that $\left|\mathcal{P}_{n}\left(\mathcal{Y} \mid P_{(T U)_{i} X_{j}}\right)\right|$ is polynomial in $n$ by Lemma 1, we obtain that, for any $\delta>0$, there exists a $Y$-decoder $\varphi_{n}^{(0)}$ such that, given $((\mathbf{t}, \mathbf{u}), \mathbf{x}) \in$ $\Omega_{i j}$, the probability of $Y$-error is bounded by

Let $\widetilde{\Omega}=\sum_{i=1}^{m_{n}} \Omega_{i}$. The $Z$-decoder $\psi_{n}^{(0)}: \mathcal{Z}^{n} \rightarrow \Omega$ is defined by

It can be shown in a similar manner by using (3) in Lemma 2 that, under the decoder $\psi_{n}^{(0)}$, the probability of the $Z$-error is bounded by

Theorem 1 is an auxiliary result for the channel coding problem for the 2 -user asymmetric channel. To apply it to our 2-user source-channel system, we need to design the encoders which can map a pair of correlated source messages to a particular ( $\mathbf{t}, \mathbf{u}, \mathbf{x}$ ) with a joint type, so that the total probabilities of error still vanish exponentially. We hence can establish the following bounds.

Theorem 2 Given arbitrary and finite alphabet $\mathcal{T}$, for any $\widetilde{P}_{T U X} \in \mathcal{P}(\mathcal{T} \times \mathcal{U} \times \mathcal{X})$, the following exponent pair is universally achievable,

where $W_{Y \mid T U X}$ and $W_{Z \mid T U X}$ are marginal distributions of $W_{Y Z \mid T U X}$, which is the augmented conditional distribution from $W_{Y Z \mid U X}$. Furthermore, given $Q_{S L}, W_{Y Z \mid U X}$, and $\tau$, the system JSCC error exponent satisfies

where the supremum is taken over all finite alphabets $\mathcal{T}$, and the maximum is taken over all the joint distributions on $\mathcal{P}(\mathcal{T} \times \mathcal{U} \times \mathcal{X})$ and $E_{r}\left(R_{1}, R_{2}, W_{Y Z \mid T U X}, P_{T U X}\right)$ is given by

We remark that (29) and (30) can be achieved by a sequence of codes without the knowledge of $Q_{S L}$ and $W_{Y Z \mid U X}$, but the lower bound (31) is achieved by a sequence of codes that needs to know the statistics of the channel.

Proof of Theorem 2: We first prove the achievable error exponent pair (29) and (30). We need to show that, for any given $\widetilde{P}_{T U X} \in \mathcal{P}(\mathcal{T} \times \mathcal{U} \times \mathcal{X})$ and $\delta>0$, there exists a sequence of JSC codes such that both the probabilities of decoding error are upper bounded by

For each type $P_{S_{i}} \in \mathcal{P}_{\tau n}(\mathcal{S}), i=1,2, \ldots, m_{n}$, denote $N_{i}$ be the cardinalities of these type classes, $N_{i} \triangleq\left|\mathbb{T}_{S_{i}}\right|$, and set $m_{\text {in }}^{\prime} \triangleq\left|\mathcal{P}_{\tau n}\left(\mathcal{L} \mid P_{S_{i}}\right)\right|$. For each conditional type $P_{L_{j} \mid S_{i}} \in \mathcal{P}_{\tau n}\left(\mathcal{L} \mid P_{S_{i}}\right), j=1,2, \ldots, m_{i n}^{\prime}$, denote $M_{i j}$ be the cardinalities of these type classes, $M_{i j} \triangleq\left|\mathbb{T}_{L_{j} \mid S_{i}}(\mathbf{s})\right|$ where $\mathbf{s}$ is an arbitrary sequence in $\mathbb{T}_{S_{i}}$. Note that $\left|\mathbb{T}_{L_{j} \mid S_{i}}(\mathbf{s})\right|$ is constant for all $\mathbf{s} \in \mathbb{T}_{S_{i}} . R_{i}$ and $R_{i j}$ are respectively given by $\frac{1}{n} \log _{2} N_{i}$ and $\frac{1}{n} \log _{2} M_{i j}$.

Now no matter whether the given $\widetilde{P}_{T U X}$ belongs to $\mathcal{P}_{n}(\mathcal{T} \times \mathcal{U} \times \mathcal{X})$ or not, we always can find a sequence of joint types $\left\{P_{T U X} \in \mathcal{P}_{n}(\mathcal{T} \times \mathcal{U} \times \mathcal{X})\right\}_{n=1}^{\infty}$ such that $P_{T U X} \rightarrow \widetilde{P}_{T U X}$ uniformly ${ }^{2}$ as $n \rightarrow \infty$. Thus, we can choose, by the continuity of $E_{k}\left(R_{i}, R_{i j}, W_{k \mid T U X}, \widetilde{P}_{T U X}\right)$ with respect to $\widetilde{P}_{T U X}$, for each $i=1,2, \ldots, m_{n}$, and $j=j(i)=1,2, \ldots, m_{i n}^{\prime}$, the joint type $P_{(T U)_{i} X_{j}}=P_{T U X}$ such that the following are satisfied

Since the type $P_{T U X}$ can also be regarded as a joint distribution, let $P_{(T U)_{i}}=$ $P_{T U} \in \mathcal{P}_{n}(\mathcal{T} \times \mathcal{U})$ be the marginal distribution on $\mathcal{T} \times \mathcal{U}$ induced by $P_{T U X}$ for all $i=1,2, \ldots, m_{n}$ and let $P_{X_{j} \mid(T U)_{i}}=P_{X \mid T U} \in \mathcal{P}_{n}\left(\mathcal{X} \mid P_{T U}\right)$ be the corresponding conditional distribution for all $i=1,2, \ldots, m_{n}$ and $j=1,2, \ldots, m_{\text {in }}^{\prime}$, i.e., $P_{X \mid T U}(\mathbf{x} \mid \mathbf{t}, \mathbf{u})=P_{T U X}(\mathbf{t}, \mathbf{u}, \mathbf{x}) / P_{T U}(\mathbf{t}, \mathbf{u})$ for any $(\mathbf{t}, \mathbf{u}, \mathbf{x}) \in \mathbb{T}_{T U X}$.

Without loss of generality, we assume, for the choice of $N_{i}, M_{i j}, P_{(T U)_{i}}$, and $P_{X_{j} \mid(T U)_{i}}$, the following conditions are satisfied for $i=1,2, \ldots, \widehat{m}_{n}, j=1,2, \ldots, \widehat{m}_{i n}^{\prime}$,

Then according to Theorem 1 , there exist pairwise disjoint subsets $\Omega_{i j} \subseteq \mathbb{T}_{(T U)_{i} X_{j}}$ with $\left|\Omega_{i j}\right|=N_{i} M_{i j}, i=1,2, \ldots, \widehat{m}_{n}, j=1,2, \ldots, \widehat{m}_{i n}^{\prime}$, and a pair of mappings $\left(\varphi_{n}^{(0)}, \psi_{n}^{(0)}\right)$,

[^2]such that the probabilities of erroneous transmission of a $((\mathbf{t}, \mathbf{u}), \mathbf{x}) \in \Omega_{i j}$ are simultaneously bounded for the channel $W_{Y Z \mid T U X}$ as

Therefore, we may construct the JSC code $\left(f_{n}, g_{n}, \varphi_{n}, \psi_{n}\right)$ for CS $Q_{S L}$ and the 2-user channel $W_{Y Z \mid U X}$ as follows. Without the loss of generality, we assume that the alphabets $\mathcal{U}$ and $\mathcal{X}$ contain the element 0 .

Encoder $g_{n}$ : For the message $\mathbf{s} \in \mathbb{T}_{S_{i}}$ such that $i>\widehat{m}_{n}$, let $g_{n}(\mathbf{s})=\mathbf{0} \in \mathcal{U}^{n}$. Denote $\widetilde{\Omega}=\bigcup_{i} \Omega_{i}$. For the $\mathbf{s} \in \mathbb{T}_{S_{i}}$ such that $i \leq \widehat{m}_{n}$, let $g_{n}^{(1)}: \mathcal{S}^{\tau n} \rightarrow \widetilde{\Omega}$ be a bijection that maps each $\mathbf{s} \in \mathbb{T}_{S_{i}}$ to the corresponding $(\mathbf{t}, \mathbf{u}) \in \Omega_{i}$, by noting that $\left|\Omega_{i}\right|=\left|\mathbb{T}_{S_{i}}\right|=N_{i}$. Finally, let $g_{n}(\mathbf{s})$ be the second component $\mathbf{u}$ of $g_{n}^{(1)}(\mathbf{s})$.

Encoder $f_{n}$ : For the message pair $(\mathbf{s}, \mathbf{l}) \in \mathbb{T}_{S_{i} L_{j}}$ such that $i>\widehat{m}_{n}$ or $j>\widehat{m}_{\text {in }}^{\prime}$, let $f_{n}(\mathbf{s}, \mathbf{l})=\mathbf{0} \in \mathcal{X}^{n}$. For the $(\mathbf{s}, \mathbf{l}) \in \mathbb{T}_{S_{i} L_{j}}$ such that $i \leq \widehat{m}_{n}$ and $j \leq \widehat{m}_{i n}^{\prime}$, noting that $\left|\mathbb{T}_{L_{j} \mid S_{i}}(\mathbf{s})\right|=\left|\Omega_{i j}\left(\varphi_{n}(\mathbf{s})\right)\right|=M_{i j}$ if $\mathbf{s} \in \mathbb{T}_{S_{i}}$, let $f_{n}^{(1)}(\mathbf{s}, \cdot): \mathbb{T}_{L_{j} \mid S_{i}}(\mathbf{s}) \rightarrow \Omega_{i j}\left(g_{n}(\mathbf{s})\right)$ be a bijection such that $f_{n}^{(1)}(\mathbf{s}, \mathbf{l})=\left(g_{n}^{(1)}(\mathbf{s}), \mathbf{x}\right) \in \Omega_{i j}$. Let $f_{n}(\mathbf{s}, \mathbf{l})$ be the third component $\mathbf{x}$ of $f_{n}^{(1)}(\mathbf{s}, \mathbf{l})$.

Clearly, the JSC encoders $\left(f_{n}, g_{n}\right)$, although working independently, they map each ( $\left.\mathbf{s}, \mathbf{l}\right) \in \mathbb{T}_{S_{i} L_{j}}$ to a unique pair ( $\mathbf{u}, \mathbf{x}$ ) when $i \leq \widehat{m}_{n}$ and $j \leq \widehat{m}_{i n}^{\prime}$, and to $(\cdot, \mathbf{0})$ otherwise (in this case an error is declared).

(1) The sources can be transmitted over the channel with $P_{e}^{(n)} \rightarrow 0$ as $n \rightarrow \infty$ if $\left(\tau H_{Q}(S), \tau H_{Q}(L \mid S)\right) \in$ $\mathcal{R}\left(W_{Y Z \mid U X}\right)$;
(2) Conversely, if the sources can be transmitted over the channel with an arbitrarily small probability of error $P_{e}^{(n)}$ as $n \rightarrow \infty$, then $\left(\tau H_{Q}(S), \tau H_{Q}(L \mid S)\right) \in \mathcal{R}\left(W_{Y Z \mid U X}\right)$ with $<$ replaced by $\leq$ in $\mathcal{R}\left(W_{Y Z \mid U X}\right)$.

## Proof:

Forward Part (1): It follows from (16)-(18) that $E_{r}\left(R_{1}, R_{2}, W_{Y Z \mid T U X}, P_{T U X}\right)>0$ if and only if $\left(R_{1}, R_{2}\right) \in$ $\mathcal{R}\left(W_{Y Z \mid T U X}, P_{T U X}\right)$. It then follows that $E_{r}\left(R_{1}, R_{2}, W_{Y Z \mid U X}\right)>0$ if $\left(R_{1}, R_{2}\right) \in \mathcal{R}\left(W_{Y Z \mid U X}\right)$. According to Theorem 2 and the definition of the system JSCC error exponent, $P_{e}^{(n)} \rightarrow 0$ if the lower bound (31) is positive, which needs $E_{r}\left(\tau H_{P}(S), \tau H_{P}(L \mid S), W_{Y Z \mid U X}\right)>0$. This means $P_{e}^{(n)} \rightarrow 0$ if the pair $\left(\tau H_{Q}(S), \tau H_{Q}(L \mid S)\right) \in \mathcal{R}\left(W_{Y Z \mid U X}\right)$.

Converse Part (2): The proof follows from a similar manner as the converse part of [15, Theorem 1] for a broadcast channel. For the sake of completeness, we also provide a full proof here since we deal with a 2 -user channel. First, we remark that (as shown in [15, Theorem 2]) the region $\mathcal{R}\left(W_{Y Z \mid T U X}, P_{T U X}\right)$ can be equivalently rewritten by

k H(S, L) & =H\left(S^{k}, L^{k}\right) \\
& =I\left(S^{k}, L^{k} ; Y^{n}\right)+H\left(S^{k}, L^{k} \mid Y^{n}\right) \\
& \leq I\left(X^{n}, U^{n} ; Y^{n}\right)+n \epsilon_{1 n} \\
& =\sum_{i=1}^{n} I\left(U_{i}, X_{i} ; Y_{i}\right)+n \epsilon_{1 n} \\
& \leq \sum_{i=1}^{n} I\left(T_{i}, U_{i}, X_{i} ; Y_{i}\right)+n \epsilon_{1 n} . \tag{49}
\end{align*}
$$

Likewise, it follows from (47) that

& \leq \sum_{i=1}^{n} I\left(S^{k}, \mathbf{Z}^{i+1} ; Z_{i}\right)+n \epsilon_{2 n} \\
& \leq \sum_{i=1}^{n} I\left(S^{k}, \mathbf{Y}^{i-1}, \mathbf{Z}^{i+1}, U_{i} ; Z_{i}\right)+n \epsilon_{2 n} \\
& =\sum_{i=1}^{n} I\left(T_{i}, U_{i} ; Z_{i}\right)+n \epsilon_{2 n} . \tag{50}
\end{align*}

Note also that $T_{i} \longrightarrow\left(U_{i}, X_{i}\right) \longrightarrow\left(Y_{i}, Z_{i}\right)$ for all $1 \leq i \leq n$. According to (48), (49), and (50), and recalling that $k=\tau n$, it is easy to show that there exists an auxiliary RV $T$ with $P_{T U X Y Z}=P_{T} P_{U X \mid T} W_{Y Z \mid U X}$ such

\tau H(L \mid S) & \leq I_{P_{T U X Y Z}}(X ; Y \mid T, U)
\end{aligned}

Finally, by using the Carathéodory theorem (cf. [11, p. 311]) we can show that there exists a RV $\widehat{T}$ with $|\widehat{\mathcal{T}}| \leq|\mathcal{U}||\mathcal{X}|+2$ such that $P_{\widehat{T} U X Y Z}=P_{\widehat{T}} P_{U X \mid \widehat{T}} W_{Y Z \mid U X}$ and

\end{aligned}

This completes the proof of the converse part.

### 4.4 The Upper Bound to $E_{J}$

In [8], Csiszár also established an upper bound for the JSCC error exponent for the point-to-point discrete memoryless source-channel system in terms of the source and channel error exponents by a simple type counting argument. He shows that the JSCC error exponent is always less than the infimum of the sum of the source and channel error exponent, even though the channel error exponent is only partially known for high rates. This conceptual bound cannot currently be computed as the channel error exponent is not yet fully known for all achievable coding rates, but it directly implies that any upper bound for the channel error exponent yields a corresponding upper bound for the JSCC error exponent. For the asymmetric 2user channel, it can be shown by using a similar approach based on the method of types that the following is true.

As a special case of the JSCC system, let the (common and private) message pair ( $\mathbf{s}, \mathbf{l}$ ) be uniformly drawn from the finite set $\mathcal{M}_{s} \times \mathcal{M}_{l}$, where $\mathcal{M}_{s} \triangleq\left\{1,2, \ldots, M_{s}\right\}$ and $\mathcal{M}_{l} \triangleq\left\{1,2, \ldots, M_{l}\right\}$. An asymmetric 2user channel code with block length $n$ for transmitting the uniform message set is a quadruple of mappings, $\left(f_{c n}, g_{c n}, \varphi_{c n}, \psi_{c n}\right)$, where $f_{c n}: \mathcal{M}_{s} \times \mathcal{M}_{l} \rightarrow \mathcal{X}^{n}$ and $g_{c n}: \mathcal{M}_{s} \rightarrow \mathcal{U}^{n}$ are the channel encoders, and $\varphi_{c n}$ : $\mathcal{Y}^{n} \rightarrow \mathcal{M}_{s} \times \mathcal{M}_{l}$ and $\psi_{c n}: \mathcal{Z}^{n} \rightarrow \mathcal{M}_{s}$ are respectively the $Y$-decoder and $Z$-decoder. Let $R_{1} \triangleq \frac{1}{n} \log _{2} M_{s}$ and $R_{2} \triangleq \frac{1}{n} \log _{2} M_{l}$ be the common and private rates of the code respectively. The probabilities of $Y$ - and $Z$-error of the channel coding are respectively given by

P_{Y e}^{(n)}\left(R_{1}, R_{2}, W_{Y Y \mid U X}\right) \triangleq \operatorname{Pr}\left(\left\{\varphi_{c n}(\mathbf{y}) \neq(\mathbf{s}, \mathbf{l})\right\}\right)=\frac{1}{2^{R_{1}+R_{2}}} \sum_{\mathbf{s}, \mathbf{l}} \sum_{\mathbf{y}: \varphi_{c n}(\mathbf{y}) \neq(\mathbf{s}, \mathbf{l})} W_{Y \mid X}^{(n)}(\mathbf{y} \mid \mathbf{u}, \mathbf{x}) \tag{51}
\end{equation*}
$$

and

$$
\begin{equation*}
P_{Z e}^{(n)}\left(R_{1}, R_{2}, W_{Y Z \mid U X}\right) \triangleq \operatorname{Pr}\left(\left\{\psi_{c n}(\mathbf{z}) \neq \mathbf{s}\right\}\right)=\frac{1}{2^{R_{1}+R_{2}}} \sum_{\mathbf{s}, 1} \sum_{\mathbf{z}: \psi_{c n}(\mathbf{z}) \neq \mathbf{s}} W_{Z \mid X}^{(n)}(\mathbf{z} \mid \mathbf{u}, \mathbf{x}) \tag{52}
\end{equation*}
$$

where $\mathbf{x} \triangleq f_{c n}(\mathbf{s}, \mathbf{l})$ and $\mathbf{u} \triangleq g_{c n}(\mathbf{s})$. Similarly, the probability of the overall asymmetric 2 -user channel coding error is given by

where $(\mathbf{s}, \mathbf{l})$ are uniformly drawn from $\mathcal{M}_{s} \times \mathcal{M}_{l}$.
Definition 2 The asymmetric 2 -user channel coding error exponent $E\left(R_{1}, R_{2}, W_{Y Z \mid U X}\right)$, for any $R_{1}>0$ and $R_{2}>0$, is defined by the supremum of the set of all numbers $E_{c}$ for which there exists a sequence of asymmetric channel codes $\left(f_{c n}, g_{c n}, \varphi_{c n}, \psi_{c n}\right)$ with blocklength $n$, the common rate no less than $R_{1}$, and the private rate no less than $R_{2}$, such that

E_{c} \leq \liminf _{n \rightarrow \infty}-\frac{1}{n} \log _{2} P_{e}^{(n)}\left(R_{1}, R_{2}, W_{Y Z \mid U X}\right) . \tag{54}

Clearly, for any sequence of channel codes $\left(f_{c n}, g_{c n}, \varphi_{c n}, \psi_{c n}\right), P_{e}^{(n)}\left(R_{1}, R_{2}, W_{Y Z \mid U X}\right)$ must be larger than $P_{Y e}^{(n)}\left(R_{1}, R_{2}, W_{Y \mid U X}\right)$ and $\left.P_{Z e}^{(n)}\left(R_{1}, R_{2}, W_{Z \mid U X}\right)\right)$ but less than the sum of the two, so we have $\liminf _{n \rightarrow \infty}-\frac{1}{n} \log _{2} P_{e}^{(n)}\left(R_{1}, R_{2}, W_{Y Z \mid U X}\right)=\liminf _{n \rightarrow \infty}-\frac{1}{n} \log _{2} \max \left(P_{Y e}^{(n)}\left(R_{1}, R_{2}, W_{Y \mid U X}\right), P_{Z e}^{(n)}\left(R_{1}, R_{2}, W_{Z \mid U X}\right)\right)$.

Our upper bound for the system JSCC error exponent is stated as follows.
Theorem 4 Given $Q_{S L}, W_{Y Z \mid U X}$, and $\tau$, the system JSCC error exponent satisfies

\end{equation*}

where $E\left(\cdot, \cdot, W_{Y Z \mid U X}\right)$ is the corresponding channel coding error exponent for the asymmetric 2-user channel.

Proof: First, we write from (8) that

where $P_{Y e}\left(\mathbb{T}_{S L}\right)$ and $P_{Z e}\left(\mathbb{T}_{S L}\right)$ are given by (9) and (10). Comparing (9) with (51), and comparing (10) with (52), we note that $P_{Y e}\left(\mathbb{T}_{S L}\right)$ and $P_{Z e}\left(\mathbb{T}_{S L}\right)$ can be interpreted as the probabilities of $Y$-error and $Z$-error of the asymmetric 2 -user channel coding with (common and private) message sets $\mathbb{T}_{S L}$, since ( $\mathbf{s}, \mathbf{l}$ ) are uniformly distributed on $\mathbb{T}_{S L}$. For any $P_{S L} \in \mathcal{P}_{\tau n}(\mathcal{S} \times \mathcal{L})$, let $P_{S}$ and $P_{L \mid S}$ be the marginal and conditional distributions induced by $P_{S L}$. Recall that for each $\mathbf{s} \in \mathbb{T}_{S}=\mathbb{T}_{P_{S}}$,

and that $\mathbb{T}_{L \mid S}(\mathbf{s})$ is the same set for all $\mathbf{s} \in \mathbb{T}_{S}$. Hence, we can write $\mathbb{T}_{S L}$ by the product of two sets $\mathbb{T}_{S L}=\mathbb{T}_{S} \times \mathbb{T}_{L \mid S}(\mathbf{s})$. Setting $R_{1}=\frac{1}{n} \log _{2}\left|\mathbb{T}_{S}\right|$ and $R_{2}=\frac{1}{n} \log _{2}\left|\mathbb{T}_{L \mid S}(\mathbf{s})\right|$, it follows that, by the definition of asymmetric 2 -user channel coding error exponent and (55),

& =E\left(\tau H_{P}(S), \tau H_{P}(L \mid S), W_{Y Z \mid U X}\right)
\end{aligned}
$$

for any sequence of JSC $\operatorname{codes}\left(f_{n}, \varphi_{n}, \psi_{n}\right)$, recalling Lemma 1 that

According to (13), we write

& \quad=\liminf _{n \rightarrow \infty}-\frac{1}{n} \log _{2} \max \left(P_{Y e}^{(n)}\left(Q_{S L}, W_{Y \mid X}, \tau\right), P_{Z e}^{(n)}\left(Q_{S L}, W_{Z \mid X}, \tau\right)\right) \\
& \leq \liminf _{n \rightarrow \infty}-\frac{1}{n} \log _{2} \max _{i=Y, Z} \max _{P_{S L} \in \mathcal{P}_{\tau n}(\mathcal{S} \times \mathcal{L})} Q_{S L}^{(\tau n)}\left(\mathbb{T}_{S L}\right) P_{i e}\left(\mathbb{T}_{S L}\right) \\
& =\inf _{P_{S L} \in \mathcal{P}(\mathcal{S} \times \mathcal{L})} \liminf _{n \rightarrow \infty}-\frac{1}{n} \log _{2} Q_{S L}^{(\tau n)}\left(\mathbb{T}_{S L}\right) \max _{i=Y, Z} P_{i e}\left(\mathbb{T}_{S L}\right) \\
& =\inf _{P_{S L} \in \mathcal{P}(\mathcal{S} \times \mathcal{L})}\left[\liminf _{n \rightarrow \infty}-\frac{1}{n} \log _{2} Q_{S L}^{(\tau n)}\left(\mathbb{T}_{S L}\right)+\liminf _{n \rightarrow \infty}-\frac{1}{n} \log _{2} \max _{i=Y, Z} P_{i e}\left(\mathbb{T}_{S L}\right)\right] \\
& \quad \leq \inf _{P_{S L} \in \mathcal{P}(\mathcal{S} \times \mathcal{L})}\left[\tau D\left(P_{S L} \| Q_{S L}\right)+E\left(\tau H_{P}(S), \tau H_{P}(L \mid S), W_{Y Z \mid U X}\right)\right] .
\end{aligned}
$$

Since the above bound holds for any sequence of JSC codes, we complete the proof of Theorem 4.

## 5 Applications to CS-AMAC and CS-ABC Systems

As pointed out in the introduction, our results obtained in the previous section can be directly applied to the CS-AMAC and CS-ABC source-channel systems.

### 5.1 CS-AMAC System

Setting $|\mathcal{Z}|=1$ and removing the decoder $\psi_{n}$, the 2-user asymmetric channel $W_{Y Z \mid U X}$ reduces to an AMAC $W_{Y \mid U X}$. Since the CS-AMAC system is a special case of the 2 -user system, the quantities defined before, including the system (overall) probability of error, the system JSCC error exponent, and also the channel error exponent still hold for the CS-AMAC system. Note that there is only one decoder, so we do
not have " $Z$-error" and achievable error exponent pair here. The first union in (45) can be removed since the largest region is given by $|\mathcal{T}|=1$. In fact, for any $T \rightarrow(U, X) \rightarrow Y, I(T, U, X ; Y)=I(U, X ; Y)$ and $I(X ; Y \mid T, U) \leq I(X ; Y \mid U)$. Thus Theorem 3 reduces to the same JSCC theorem established in [4] for the CS-AMAC system. Now if we choose the auxiliary alphabet $|\mathcal{T}|=1$, we specialize Theorems 2 and 4 to the following corollary.

Corollary 1 Given $Q_{S L}, W_{Y \mid U X}$ and $\tau$, the system JSCC error exponent satisfies

\end{equation*}
$$

and

$$
\begin{equation*}
E_{J}\left(Q_{S L}, W_{Y \mid U X}, \tau\right) \leq \inf _{P_{S L}}\left[\tau D\left(P_{S L} \| Q_{S L}\right)+E\left(\tau H_{P}(S), \tau H_{P}(L \mid S), W_{Y \mid U X}\right)\right] \tag{59}
\end{equation*}
$$

where $E\left(\tau H_{P}(S), \tau H_{P}(L \mid S), W_{Y \mid U X}\right)$ is the channel error exponent defined in (54), and

$$
\begin{equation*}
E_{r}\left(R_{1}, R_{2}, W_{Y \mid U X}\right)=\max _{P_{U X}} E_{Y}\left(R_{1}, R_{2}, W_{Y \mid U X}, P_{U X}\right) \tag{60}
\end{equation*}
$$

where $E_{Y}\left(R_{1}, R_{2}, W_{Y \mid U X}, P_{U X}\right)$ is defined in (14) by setting $T=1$.

It has been shown in [2] that for any $R_{1}>0$ and $R_{2}>0$, the channel exponent for AMAC $W_{Y \mid U X}$ satisfies

E\left(R_{1}, R_{2}, W_{Y Z \mid X}\right) \leq E_{s p}\left(R_{1}, R_{2}, W_{Y \mid U X}\right),
$$

where

$$
\begin{equation*}
E_{s p}\left(R_{1}, R_{2}, W_{Y \mid U X}\right) \triangleq \max _{P_{U X} \in \mathcal{P}(\mathcal{U} \times \mathcal{X})} \min D\left(V_{Y \mid U X} \| W_{Y \mid U X} \mid P_{U X}\right), \tag{61}
\end{equation*}
$$

where the minimum is taken over $V_{Y \mid U X} \in \mathcal{P}(\mathcal{Y} \mid \mathcal{U} \times \mathcal{X})$ such that $I_{P_{U X} V_{Y \mid U X}}(U, X ; Y) \leq R_{1}+R_{2}$ or $I_{P_{U X} V_{Y \mid U X}}(X ; Y \mid U) \leq R_{2}$.

As a consequence, we see that

E_{J}\left(Q_{S L}, W_{Y \mid U X}, \tau\right) \leq \inf _{P_{S L}}\left[\tau D\left(P_{S L} \| Q_{S L}\right)+E_{s p}\left(\tau H_{P}(S), \tau H_{P}(L \mid S), W_{Y \mid U X}\right)\right] . \tag{62}
\end{equation*}
$$

In Section 6 we investigate the lower and upper bounds when the AMAC has a symmetric distribution.

### 5.2 CS-ABC System

Setting $|\mathcal{U}|=1$ and removing the encoder $g_{n}$, the 2-user asymmetric channel $W_{Y Z \mid U X}$ reduces to an ABC $W_{Y Z \mid X}$. The quantities defined before, including the probabilities of error at $Y$-decoder and $Z$-decoder, the achievable error exponent pair, system (overall) probability of error, the system JSCC error exponent, and the channel error exponent still hold for the CS-ABC system. Given arbitrary and finite auxiliary alphabet $\mathcal{T}$, we augment the channel $W_{Y Z \mid X}$ to $W_{Y Z \mid T X}$ by introducing an $\mathrm{RV} T \in \mathcal{T}$ such that $T \rightarrow X \rightarrow(Y Z)$.

Similarly, the marginal distributions of the augmented channel are denoted by $W_{Y \mid T X}$ and $W_{Z \mid T X}$. We then specialize Theorems 2, 3 and 4 to the following corollaries.

Given $W_{Y Z \mid X}, \mathcal{R}\left(W_{Y Z \mid U X}\right)$ reduces to $\mathcal{R}\left(W_{Y Z \mid X}\right)$ given by

\mathcal{R}\left(W_{Y Z \mid X}\right) \triangleq \bigcup_{\mathcal{T}:|\mathcal{T}| \leq|\mathcal{X}|+2} \bigcup_{P_{T X} \in \mathcal{P}(\mathcal{T} \times \mathcal{X})} \mathcal{R}\left(W_{Y Z \mid T X}, P_{T X}\right) \tag{63}
\end{equation*}
$$

where

$$
\mathcal{R}\left(W_{Y Z \mid T X}, P_{T X}\right)=\left\{\begin{array}{ll} 
& R_{1}+R_{2}<I(T, X ; Y) \\
\left(R_{1}, R_{2}\right): & R_{1}<I(T ; Z) \\
& R_{2}<I(X ; Y \mid T)
\end{array}\right\}
$$

where the mutual informations are taken under the joint distribution $P_{T X Y Z}=P_{T X} W_{Y Z \mid X}$. We remark that $\mathcal{R}\left(W_{Y Z \mid X}\right)$ is the capacity region of the $\mathrm{ABC} W_{Y Z \mid X}$ [19].

Corollary 2 (JSCC Theorem for CS-ABC system) Given $Q_{S L}, W_{Y Z \mid U X}$ and $\tau>0$, the following statements hold.
(1) The sources can be transmitted over the channel with $P_{e}^{(n)} \rightarrow 0$ as $n \rightarrow \infty$ if $\left(\tau H_{Q}(S), \tau H_{Q}(L \mid S)\right) \in$ $\mathcal{R}\left(W_{Y Z \mid X}\right)$;
(2) Conversely, if the sources can be transmitted over the channel with an arbitrarily small probability of error $P_{e}^{(n)}$ as $n \rightarrow \infty$, then $\left(\tau H_{Q}(S), \tau H_{Q}(L \mid S)\right) \in \mathcal{R}\left(W_{Y Z \mid X}\right.$ with $<$ replaced by $\leq \operatorname{in} \mathcal{R}\left(W_{Y Z \mid X}\right)$.

Corollary 3 Given arbitrary and finite alphabet $\mathcal{T}$, for any $\widetilde{P}_{T X} \in \mathcal{P}(\mathcal{T} \times \mathcal{X})$, the following exponent pair is universally achievable,

E_{J Y}\left(Q_{S L}, W_{Y Z \mid T X}, \widetilde{P}_{T X}, \tau\right) \triangleq \min _{P_{S L}}\left[\tau D\left(P_{S L} \| Q_{S L}\right)+E_{Y}\left(\tau H_{P}(S), \tau H_{P}(L \mid S), W_{Y \mid T X}, \widetilde{P}_{T X}\right)\right] \tag{64}
\end{equation*}
$$

and

$$
\begin{equation*}

## 6 Evaluation of the Bounds for $E_{J}$

We established the lower and upper bounds for the system JSCC error exponent for asymmetric 2-user JSCC systems. However, we are not able to simplify these bounds for general 2-user JSCC systems (even for general CS-AMAC and CS-ABC systems) to a computable parametric form as we did for the point-to-point systems [23, 24]. In the following we only address the special case for CS-AMAC systems when the channel admits some symmetric transition probability distributions. We first introduce the parametric form of the functions $E_{r}\left(R_{1}, R_{2}, W_{Y \mid U X}\right)$ defined in (60) and $E_{s p}\left(R_{1}, R_{2}, W_{Y \mid U X}\right)$ defined in (61). For any $R_{1}, R_{2}>0$, rewrite

Definition 3 [2] We say that the multiple access channel $W_{Y \mid U X}$ is $U$-symmetric if for every $u \in \mathcal{U}$ the transition matrix $W_{Y \mid U X}(\cdot \mid u, \cdot)$ is symmetric in the sense that the rows (respectively columns) are permutations of each other. An $X$-symmetric multiple access channel is defined similarly. We then say that $W_{Y \mid U X}$ is symmetric if it is both $U$-symmetric and $X$-symmetric.

It follows that the multiple access channel with additive noise is symmetric (e.g., see the example below), where a multiple access channel $W_{Y \mid U X}$ with (modulo $B$ ) additive noise $\left\{P_{F}: \mathcal{F}\right\}$ is described as

where $Y_{i} \in \mathcal{Y}, X_{i} \in \mathcal{X}, U_{i} \in \mathcal{U}$ and $F_{i} \in \mathcal{F}$ are the channel's output, two input and noise symbols at time $i$ such that $\mathcal{Y}=\mathcal{U}=\mathcal{X}=\mathcal{F}=\{0,1,2, \ldots, B-1\}$, and $F_{i}$ is independent of $X_{i}$ and $U_{i}, i=1,2, \ldots, n$.

It is shown in [2] that if the multiple access channel $W_{Y \mid U X}$ is $U$-symmetric, then the outer maximum of (74) and (75) would be achieved by a joint distribution with the form $P_{U X}(u, x)=P_{U}(u) /|\mathcal{X}|$ for every $x$ and $u$. It then follows that for the symmetric multiple access channel, the maximum of (74) and (75) would be achieved by a uniform joint distribution

In Fig. 2, we plot the lower and upper bounds for the JSCC error exponent $E_{J}$ for different $(q, \epsilon)$ pairs with transmission rate $t=0.25,0.35$. As illustrated, the upper and lower bounds coincide (this can be verified by checking whether the two outer minimums in (82) are achieved by the same $i$ and the inner maximum in the upper bound is achieved by $\rho \leq 1$ ) for many ( $q, \epsilon$ ) pairs (e.g., when $\tau=0.25, q=0.1, \epsilon \geq 0.0205$ and when $\tau=0.35, q=0.1, \epsilon \geq 0.0056$ ), and hence exactly determine the exponent.

## A Proof of Lemma 2

Although the result (3) of Lemma 2 was already shown in [8], we include its proof here since we need to show that (3) holds simultaneously with (4) and (5). We employ a random selection argument as used in [8]. For each $i=1,2, \ldots, m_{n}$, we randomly generate a set of $2 N_{i}$ sequences (according to a uniform distribution) from the type class $\mathbb{T}_{A_{i}}=\mathbb{T}_{P_{A_{i}}}, \mathcal{C}_{i} \triangleq\left\{\mathbf{a}_{1}^{(i)}, \mathbf{a}_{2}^{(i)}, \ldots, \mathbf{a}_{2 N_{i}}^{(i)}\right\} \subseteq \mathbb{T}_{A_{i}}$, i.e., each $\mathbf{a}_{p}^{(i)}$ is randomly drawn from the type class $\mathbb{T}_{A_{i}}$ with probability $1 /\left|\mathbb{T}_{A_{i}}\right|, p=1,2, \ldots, 2 N_{i}$. Each sets has $2 N_{i}$ elements rather than $N_{i}$ because an expurgate operation will be performed later. Also, we denote the set $\mathcal{C}_{i}^{p} \triangleq \mathcal{C}_{i} /\left\{\mathbf{a}_{p}^{(i)}\right\}$.

Now for each $i$ with associated $j=j(i)=1,2, \ldots, m_{i n}^{\prime}$, we randomly generate $4 N_{i} M_{i j}$ sequences (according to a uniform distribution)

$\left|\mathcal{F}_{k, l}\left((\mathbf{t}, \mathbf{u}), \mathbf{x}, P_{(T U) X(T U)^{\prime} X^{\prime} Y}\right)\right| \leq\left|\mathbb{T}_{Y \mid(T U) X}((\mathbf{t}, \mathbf{u}), \mathbf{x})\right| \leq 2^{n H_{P(T U) X Y}(Y \mid(T, U), X)}=2^{n H_{P_{((T U))_{i} X_{j}} \hat{V}_{Y \mid(T U) X}}(Y \mid(T, U), X)}$
since for each $\mathbb{T}_{(T U) X(T U)^{\prime} X^{\prime} Y} \in \mathcal{C}_{k, l}((\mathbf{t}, \mathbf{u}), \mathbf{x})$, we have $P_{(T U) X}=P_{((T U))_{i} X_{j}}, P_{Y \mid(T U) X}=\widehat{V}_{Y \mid(T U) X}$ and hence $P_{(T U) X Y}=P_{((T U))_{i} X_{j}} \widehat{V}_{Y \mid(T U) X}$. Now substituting the following inequality (cf. [8, Eq. (28)])

into (106), combining with (107) together, we obtain

Again recall that for $P_{(T U) X(T U)^{\prime} X^{\prime} Y} \in \mathcal{C}_{k, l}((\mathbf{t}, \mathbf{u}), \mathbf{x}), P_{(T U) X Y}=P_{((T U))_{i} X_{j}} \widehat{V}_{Y \mid(T U) X}$, and note that

\end{aligned}

since by Lemma 1

## B. 2 Upper Bound on $\left|\mathbb{T}_{\widehat{V}_{Y(T U) X}}((\mathbf{t}, \mathbf{u}), \mathbf{x}) \cap \mathcal{E}_{2}\right|$

If we fix an $i=1,2, \ldots, m_{n}$ and an $l=1,2, \ldots, m_{i n}^{\prime}$, then $\mathcal{E}_{2}$ is the set of all $\mathbf{y}$ such that there exist some $\left((\mathbf{t}, \mathbf{u}), \mathbf{x}^{\prime}\right) \in \Omega_{i l}, \mathbf{x}^{\prime} \neq \mathbf{x},\left((\mathbf{t}, \mathbf{u}), \mathbf{x}, \mathbf{x}^{\prime}, \mathbf{y}\right)$ admits a joint type $P_{(\mathbf{t}, \mathbf{u}) \mathbf{x x} \mathbf{y}} \in \mathcal{P}_{n}\left(\mathcal{T} \times \mathcal{U} \times \mathcal{X}^{2} \times \mathcal{Y}\right)$ and

where $P_{(T U) X}, P_{(T U) X^{\prime}}$ and $P_{Y \mid(T U) X}$, etc, are the corresponding marginal and conditional distributions induced by $P_{(T U) X X^{\prime} Y}$, and
where $\mathbb{T}_{(T U) X X^{\prime} Y}=\mathbb{T}_{P_{(T U) X X^{\prime} Y}}$. Using a similar counting argument, and applying Lemma 2 , we can bound, for any $l=1,2, \ldots, m_{i n}^{\prime}$ and $P_{(T U) X X^{\prime} Y} \in \mathcal{C}_{l}((\mathbf{t}, \mathbf{u}), \mathbf{x})$,

& \times 2^{n\left[H_{P_{((T U))_{i} X_{j}} \hat{V}_{Y \mid(T U) X}}(Y \mid(T, U), X)-\left|\left.\right|_{I_{((T U))_{i} x_{j}} \hat{V}_{Y \mid(T U) X}}(X ; Y \mid T, U)-R_{i j}\right|^{+}\right]}
\end{aligned}
$$

since $\left|\mathcal{C}_{l}((\mathbf{t}, \mathbf{u}), \mathbf{x})\right| \leq(n+1)^{|\mathcal{T}||\mathcal{U}||\mathcal{X}|^{2}|\mathcal{Y}|}$.
